What is Strategic Publishing?

- An intentional, informed approach to publishing
- Focuses on visibility, quality, and impact





Why Strategic Publishing Matters for HDRs

- Builds academic credibility and track record
- Helps meet thesis requirements
- Supports career goals (academic and beyond)
- Increases research impact and citations
- Avoids predatory or low-quality journals





Publishing Options

- Academic journals (peer-reviewed)
- Conference papers/proceedings
- Book chapters or monographs
- Policy briefs and reports
- Creative or practice-based outputs
- Preprints and repositories
- Industry and professional publications






Identify options for publishing

Identify sources that are strong in coverage of your topic area. Methods for identifying **relevant** publications include:

- speaking with your co-authors, supervisors and colleagues
- looking at the publications you are reading and referencing
- searching academic databases for publications on your research topic
- manuscript matching tools



- Turn-around times suit your needs
- Authors rights retention and publisher policies suitable

- Impact factor
- Quartile rankings
- Acceptance rate

Qualitative Factors

- Peer review process
- Editorial board

Other considerations

- Reputation
- Publication ethics





Pathways to Open Access

- Preprints
- Research Repository
- Read and Publish agreements





Preprints

- Initial version of a research paper before peer review
- Benefits include direct management of distribution for exposure and potential feedback
- Publicly accessible on public servers or repositories
- Preprint servers are typically organized by discipline. Some notable ones for DSC include <u>Open Access Repository</u> and <u>University of Cambridge</u>
- Use <u>Open Policy finder</u> to view open access compliance for specific Journals

ART-Dok is the full-text server of the Specialised Information Service for Art, Photography and Design, arthistoricum.net and is provided by Heidelberg University Library. The publication platform offers scholars worldwide the opportunity to make their publications from the field of Art History accessible online, free of charge and in electronic form according to the principles of Open Access. The documents will be stored and their long-term availability guaranteed by using persistent identifiers (URN, DOI) and metadata (OAI-PMH). They are accessible through various international library catalogues and search engines.

As for now, ART-Dok provides free full-text access to 9,333 publications.

Predatory publishers exploit the open access model by charging authors to publish without providing proper editorial or peer review processes.

Researcher Profiles

Is a publicly accessible profile of your professional academic works and achievements

Why profiles matter

- Increase discoverability of your work
- Ensure correct attribution (avoids name confusion)
- Improves your chance of being cited and improves your citation metrics

Key platforms to maintain

- ORCID unique researcher ID; integrate with journal & grant systems
- Google Scholar public-facing citation profile
- Scopus/Web of Science track citations and metrics
- Overton / Altmetric monitor policy and societal mentions





Socialise and Promote

Leverage academic networks


Present at conferences and seminars;
 Collaborate within and beyond your institution

Use social media strategically

- Share DOIs and visuals on X/Twitter, LinkedIn & Mastodon
- Tag co-authors, institutions, and include relevant hashtags

Maximise discoverability

- Upload accepted manuscripts to your institutional repository
- Use ORCID and link to all profiles (Scopus, Google Scholar, Publons

Things to Keep in Mind

- Be intentional: Plan your publishing with purpose know your audience and goals
- Use the tools available to guide your decisions
- Quality matters more than quantity
- Publishing is part of your research identity
