Title: Displacing Heterocentrism in Adaptation: Making New Space for Textural Queerness

Abstract:

This creative practice project explores how the act of adaptation can be a method for a queer praxis, through the resistance of the presumption of heterosexuality in that adaptation practice. Queer adaptation practice is done here through a creative-critical braided adaptation thesis of Mary Shelley's Frankenstein which uses minor character elaboration and alternative focalisation to explore the queer potential of the relationship between Elizabeth Lavenza and Justine Moritz. This practice will contrast with the male-focused and heteronormalising adaptation practices that typically shape Frankenstein adaptations, and which have through repetition across many adaptations led to the development of a Frankenstein culture-text which excludes both women and queerness. In this practice of re-visioning, queer is aligned with a sense of optimistic anticipation of a future which is not-yet-here described by José Esteban Muñoz, and is shaped by a reparative reading practice inspired by the work of Eve Kosofsky Sedgwick.



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
