1. Introduction (750 characters: 100-150 words)

Purpose: Capture the selection committee's attention. Provide a concise overview of who you are, your cultural identity, and your motivation for pursuing Higher Degree by Research (HDR) studies.

Guiding Questions:

- What pronouns do you use, and how do they connect to your sense of identity or community?
- What motivates you to pursue a Higher Degree by Research (HDR)?
- What personal or community need does this research respond to?

What are your long term aspirations, and how does your research proposal fit into them?

2. Cultural and Personal Background (1000 characters: 150–200 words)

Purpose: Share your story. Explain how your life experience has shaped your research interests and career goals.

Guiding Questions:

• What has your educational journey looked like so far?

•	Were there barriers or enablers in your path to university?
•	How have your cultural values and lived experiences influenced the way you see the world and your place in it?
•	Who or what has inspired your academic and/or community leadership?
3.	Academic Background and Preparation (1000 characters: 150–200 words)
	rpose: Demonstrate academic readiness. Describe your qualifications, research training, and eas of scholarly interest.
Gu	ilding Questions:
•	What degrees or relevant qualifications do you hold?
•	What were your key academic achievements, including any thesis, projects, industry collaborations or research experience?
•	How has your academic background prepared you for HDR study?
•	Have you completed any Indigenous research methodologies coursework or participated in relevant programs?

4. Proposed Research (1250 characters: 200-250 words)

Purpose: Articulate a clear, thoughtful research direction. Show you have considered feasibility, relevance, and supervision.

Guiding Questions:

- What is your proposed research topic or area of interest?
- What questions or problems do you hope to explore?
- Why is this research important—to you, to your community, and to the field?
- What is the intended methodology or approach? Is it community-led or participatory?


Are there specific researchers, centres, or supervisors at RMIT whose work aligns with yours?

5. Alignment with University and Program (750 characters: 100-150 words)

Purpose: Show how your goals align with the institution's values and capabilities.

Guiding Questions:

- Why are you applying to this university or program?
- What support systems (e.g., Indigenous research centres, scholarships, supervisor expertise) are attractive to you?
- How does the institution's approach to Indigenous research and reconciliation resonate with your goals?

7. Closing Statement (500 characters: 50-100 words)

Purpose: End with confidence, clarity, and appreciation.

Guiding Questions:

- What final thought or message do you want the selection committee to leave with?
- How do you see this opportunity changing your life and those around you?
- What excites you most about becoming part of a research community?

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
