# **1. INTRODUCTION**

## **1.1 Background**

The ASEAN Research Collaboration Project (the project) will deliver early career researchers (ECRs) from ASEAN member states placements in Australian research institutions in shared priority areas, including agriculture and food, resources and energy, infrastructure and the green economy. The project will deepen Australia's research collaboration with ASEAN countries, strengthen people-to-people links between emerging research leaders, and help drive research commercialisation across ASEAN and Australia.

This project aims to enhance the careers of ECRs, as well as supporting mobility and research collaboration. Between 75-100 ECRs from ASEAN countries will complete a research project at an Australian research institution over 1 to 3 months. Recipients will expand their professional networks and have access to leading academics, facilities, and equipment in Australia to develop their own research interests and competencies. The project will foster opportunities to develop partnerships between research institutions in ASEAN countries and deliver high quality research outputs to help drive research commercialisation opportunities across ASEAN countries and Australia. Supported areas of focus will be in shared priority areas, including agriculture and food, resources and energy, infrastructure, and the green economy. ECRs are researchers who have completed their postdoctoral studies within eight years of applying to participate.

This project supports the Australian Government's objectives of an international education and training sector that is sustainable, high-quality, diverse and focused on integrity, as set out in the draft International Education and Skills Strategic Framework.

This project responds to the recommendations made in Australia's Southeast Asia Economic Strategy to 2040 (the SEA Economic Strategy), which notes the importance of research collaboration and recommends the Australian Government work with industry to fund further research in areas of mutual interest with Southeast Asia. Consultations with the education sector as part of developing the SEA Economic Strategy also called for research collaboration opportunities across the region.

### **Overview**

The objective of the ASEAN IEIF is to support high-achieving international post-doctoral ECRs to participate in commercially focused research in Australia, reflecting areas of mutual interest with the ASEAN region. ECRs from the region will have the opportunity to work with Australian experts and utilise materials and equipment in Australian research facilities. This opportunity will build long term commercially oriented research partnerships between ASEAN member states and Australia.

The project will support the hosting of researchers by an Australian institution for a period of one to three months to build and deepen institutional linkages, create professional networks, support professional development, and exchange expertise with Australian researchers.

One of ASEAN's key goals is to support economic and technical cooperation to address the many challenges and opportunities that face the region. Enhanced research and education cooperation among ASEAN countries fosters innovative growth as students, researchers and education providers build scientific, technological, and linguistic communities.

## 1.2 Funding allocation

Each internship is worth up to AUD\$20,000 per recipient.

## 2. INTERNSHIP ELIGIBILITY AND ENTITLEMENTS

### 2.1 Eligibility

To be eligible for internship funding, applicants must:

- Be a citizen and/or permanent resident of an of an ASEAN member state
- Not be an Australian citizen and/or permanent resident
- Have completed a PhD degree or equivalent within the eight years prior to applying to participate in this project (i.e., PhD was conferred from March 2017 onwards)
- Be available to commence their proposed program in Australia after 2 June 2025 and complete the internship by 29 August 2025
- Provide a research proposal which falls under one of the eligible research focus areas
- Provide all relevant supporting documentation in English
- Obtain a placement offer from an approved host Australian research organisation \*list provided below
- Meet the eligibility requirements to apply for and hold the relevant visa issued by the Department of Home Affairs.

### 2.3 Eligible Research Focus Areas

- Another priority area that will bolster Australia's competitiveness and drive commercialisation outcomes.

### 2.4 Financial Benefits

#### Up to \$20,000 AUD per internship (up to 3-month duration)

All internship recipients will receive any benefits in Australian Dollars:

- Establishment allowance: \$3,500 (paid once to cover for travel and visa costs)
- Monthly stipend: \$4,000 (paid up to the maximum program duration on a pro-rata basis)
- Monthly family allowance: \$1,500\* (paid up to the maximum program duration on a pro-rata basis) \*if applicable

Host organisations are eligible for a **\$1,000 subsidy per intern** to cover potential research consumables such as laboratory equipment, subscriptions, service level agreement (SLA) fees for desks/IT access and field works costs for the ECRs interning with the organisations. This amount will be transferred upon receipt of agreed KPIs and milestones

### 3. APPLICATION PROCESS

#### 3.1 2025 Application Timeline

##### Indicative Key Dates

<b>16 May 2025</b>	Successful recipients complete and return detailed project outline with Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), milestones and copies of passport
<b>From 2 June 2025 onwards</b>	Recipients commence internship program (Internships must be completed by 29 August 2025)

**A second round of the IEIF – ASEAN Research Collaboration Project will open for applications in July 2025**

#### 3.2 Application structure

**Applicants are required to respond to the following questions:**

##### Personal details

- First Name, Surname, Country of Citizenship/Permanent Residency, Email Address, Contact Number, Current Address, Date of Birth, Passport Number, Gender, Number of Dependents (if any).

##### Research experience (to be answered in plain English)

- Details on PhD: Institution name, Year of graduation and language of delivery
- Briefly list career stage, number of publications/reports/patents, significant grants, advisory or service work
- What was the research specialty of your PhD degree?
- Please show evidence of a high-level of academic achievement and your research experience relevant to your chosen field of study

##### Proposed research program (to be answered in plain English)

- What shared priority area is the focus of your proposed project?
- Provide a well-defined research program proposal with anticipated outcomes.
- Detail how this international research opportunity will benefit Australia and ASEAN in your chosen research focus area.
- Which Australian academic institution has agreed to host you if successful?
- Provide your proposed start and end dates (**Note:** All internships must begin and end in Australia. Any field work outside of Australia (if applicable), must be undertaken prior to the start of the internship in Australia. Please be mindful of visa approval timelines when choosing your starting date).
- Provide detail of the facilities that you expect your project will require
- Provide detail of the materials that you expect your project will require (e.g. online access to academic journals, specific equipment and/or chemicals, their quantities and their estimated costs)
- If successful, do you agree to work with your supervisor to create a detailed project outline before you commence your internship featuring KPIs and milestones? (These will need to be achieved and signed off by your supervisor to receive the final payment of your internship)
- Details of your sponsor (name, position, email, phone number)

**Benefits of the research program (to be answered in plain English) (maximum 200 words per question)**

- Provide information on your chosen field of study/research and how it relates to Australia and the ASEAN region
- Detail how this research internship opportunity would further your academic and/or professional career. If relevant, include details of any barriers you have previously faced in pursuing international research opportunities

**Referees**

- Give details of TWO referees who are providing referee reports (their title, name, relationship with applicant, phone number, email, position, organisation).

There is no template provided for this purpose. Your referees are free to provide the letter in any format that they feel comfortable with. Reference letters are to be sent to applicant directly. Applicant is then required to send both reference letters together with the rest of their supporting documents by email to **ieif.asean@rmit.edu.au**

**Supervisors are required to respond to the following questions:**

*Applicants must ensure that supervisors submit an applicant sponsor nomination form, or the application will be ineligible. Completed Applicant Sponsor Nomination Form is to be sent to applicant directly.*

*Applicant is then required to send this form together with the rest of their supporting documents by email to [ieif.asean@rmit.edu.au](mailto:ieif.asean@rmit.edu.au)*

**Benefits**

- Why has your organisation chosen to support the application and what benefits will be gained from the proposed program?
- How will the proposed program build or improve research partnerships in eligible research focus areas between Australia and the applicant's home country?

**Administration**

- Provide details of your proposed applicants start and end dates
- In what language have you agreed to supervise the applicant's research? Please confirm that research outputs will be delivered in English.
- If this applicant is successful, do you agree to provide them with the details of your institution's relevant support services before they arrive in Australia, as well as assist with seeking appropriate accommodation if needed?
- If this applicant is successful, do you confirm that your institution has an equivalent Health Safety and Wellbeing (HSW) policy/procedure to ensure the health, safety and wellbeing of the applicant upon commencement of the internship and will you provide a copy of the HSW policy?
- If this applicant is successful, do you agree to provide an orientation session of your institution upon commencement of the internship?
- If this applicant is successful, do you agree to work with the applicant to create a detailed project outline before commencement of the internship which includes KPIs and milestones? (This will need to be signed off by you so the applicant can receive final payment during the internship)
- Provide any further information that may be relevant to this application for the IEIF – ASEAN Research Collaboration Project

**3.3 Required Documents**

- A certified copy showing full name, date of birth and country of citizenship and any other relevant pages of the applicant's most current passport. (For application purpose, it is acceptable if your current passport has less than 1-year validity. However, if you are accepted, it is expected that you apply for a new passport as this will be linked to your visa.
- If your country of citizenship is different from your permanent residency status, please also provide a certified copy of official documentation showing evidence of permanent residency status. If the document is not in English, please also provide an official English translation.
- If you currently reside in Australia, please also provide a copy of your current VEVO check: <https://online.immi.gov.au/evo/firstParty?actionType=query>

**4. PhD Testamur/Conferral Letter/Certificate of Completion**

- A certified copy of a PhD Testamur/Conferral Letter/Certificate of Completion

**5. Two Referee Reports (Referees are free to provide the letter in any format they prefer)**

- Referee reports must be from academic supervisors, Heads of Department or other workplace managers who are familiar with the applicant's academic, research and/or performance and abilities. They should be in the form of a letter that is under one page long.

**6. Evidence of support and language suitability from the host**

- Confirmation from the academic supervisor that the applicant's language ability is suitable for their proposed research program. If the internship is going to be undertaken in English and the applicant has not completed a university course at an English-speaking university please either submit recent English test scores (either IELTS, TOEFL, TOEIC, PTE, Cambridge, CPE, or MUET), or the academic supervisor should provide a support letter to confirm that the applicant's language ability is suitable for their proposed research program. If the applicant has completed a university degree where the language of delivery was English, a support letter and/or English test scores are not required.

**7. Research CV and list of publications**

- Detailed CV with list of research outputs, publications and contributions to the applicant's field of research. Provide a brief description of career circumstances, which may have positively or negatively influenced the applicant's research productivity (including family/carer responsibilities).

**3.4 Translation**

To be eligible applicants must provide English translations of the required supporting documentation if the original documents are not in English. Applicants will also need certification of documents that have



been translated unless they are translated documents for evidence of community service or employment records.

### 3.5 Certification

To certify a document as a true copy, applicants must provide the original and a copy of the document to a formally recognised authority, professional person, or someone well-respected in the community ('of good standing'). This could include but is not limited to: university dean or course convener, teacher, work supervisor, lawyer, doctor, civil servant, Justice of the Peace, Commissioner of Oaths or Public Notary.

To certify, make a copy of the original document, take the photocopy and the original, and ask the person to certify the photocopy by:

- sign and date under the statement and provide details of their occupation
- write or use a stamp (if available), "I certify that the copy is a true copy of the original document". This phrase may be in the local language. For example:

**Chinese** - 此为原始文件的真实副本.

**Hindi** - इस मूल दस्तावेज की एक सही प्रतिलिपि है.

**Japanese** - これは原本の真正な写しである必要があります。

**Spanish** - Este documento es una copia auténtica del original.

**Vietnamese** - Sao Y Bản Chính.

The certifying person should not be:

- Related to the applicant
- Living at the same address as the applicant
- In a relationship with the applicant

Applicants must provide certified copies of their:

- Passport, Birth Certificate or National ID Card
- Academic transcripts
- IELTS or TOEFL results

The cost of any fees charged for certification of documents is the responsibility of the applicant.

## 4. ASSESSMENT

All applications are assessed for eligibility, ensuring all required documentation is provided and complete. Shortlisted applications are then assessed against the selection criteria by an independent selection panel, comprised of eminent academics, professionals and Australian Government representatives.

Administrative staff and/or selection panel members are required to adhere to the requirements of identification, disclosure and management of conflicts of interest when assessing applications. We advise applicants to note that the personal details of selection panel members are confidential and will not be released.

The judging panel will also consider ensuring a diversity of eligible countries and host institutions are represented among the successful applicants.

*Applicants are encouraged to submit an application and a proposal of their research project, which can be easily understood and communicated to external, non-subject matter expert audiences.*

#### **4.1 Selection criteria and weighting**

The following are the selection criteria and their relative weighting:

- A record of high-level academic achievement and research experience in the applicant's chosen field of study (30%)
- Well-defined research program and statement on how the research internship opportunity will benefit Australia and build the applicant's potential to foster ongoing collaboration, cooperation and commercialisation opportunities between Australia and the home country (40%)
- The extent of alignment between the applicant's chosen field of study/research and priority sectors offering the greatest potential for shared commercial engagement opportunities for both Australia and the ASEAN region (20%)
- Statement on how the research internship opportunity would further the applicant's academic and/or professional career (10%)

### **5. SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS**

#### **5.1 Notification**

The ATIH will notify all successful and unsuccessful applicants via email regarding the outcome of their applications by **early May 2025**. Details of successful recipients will be published on the ATIH website (<https://www.rmit.edu.au/partner/hubs/asia-trade-and-innovation-hub>).

#### **5.2 Detailed project outline (Template will be provided)**

Successful applicants will be required to produce a detailed project outline with their host's input prior to commencement. This will need to include:

- A timeline of project milestones including a point midway through the internship. Supervisors will be required to sign off on the KPIs up to this midway point to release the applicants' second (and final) payment.
- Materials the project will require (e.g., academic journals, equipment, specific chemicals and their quantities) and costs these may incur.

#### **5.3 Visas**

Once successful internship recipients are notified, the Australian Government Department of Education will provide a letter in support of visa applications. This letter will support a [\*\*Temporary Activity \(Subclass 408\) visa Invited Participant stream\*\*](#) OR a [\*\*Temporary Activity \(subclass 408\) visa – Research Activities stream\*\*](#). The **Invited Participant stream is highly recommended for applicants** as the current visa processing time for this stream is one to fourteen days, whereas the Research Activities Stream is

currently up to four months. The **Temporary Activity (Subclass 408) visa Invited Participant Stream** visa can be granted for up to 3 months, therefore please ensure your proposed arrival and departure dates (including travel and onshore establishment time) are within 3 months.

The **Temporary Activity (subclass 408) visa – Research Activities stream** can be granted for up to 12 months. Sponsorship is required if the visa applicant applies in Australia OR applies outside of Australia and intends to stay for more than three months. Immediate family members (members of the family unit) can also apply as dependents. For more information, please visit:

Once the Letter of Support has been issued to the internship recipient, they can lodge their visa application. Visa costs will be the responsibility of the successful intern (noting that they have been factored into the establishment allowance). Please ensure applicants take this into consideration when discussing the research period with host university. Applicants will need to personally organise their required visas and the ATIH is not responsible for visa applications or delays in processing time.

If internship recipients are bringing their immediate family members to Australia, then their details must be included in the visa application.

*The Department of Home Affairs seeks to process visa application as soon as possible. You will appreciate, however, that all non-citizens applying for visas to enter Australia are considered on an individual basis and against legal requirements set out in Australia's migration legislation. This often includes requirements that all applicants undertake and meet (where relevant) health, character and national security checks (that are undertaken by other agencies) and this can take some time. The timing for the completion of the checks varies from one case to another, depending on individual circumstances.*

## **6. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

### **6.1 Disclaimer**

The ATIH and the Australian Government do not accept responsibility for any misunderstanding arising from the failure by any applicant or hosting institution to comply with these guidelines or arising from any ambiguity, discrepancy or error contained in an application.

Applicants are responsible for all costs incurred in the preparation and lodgement of their applications.

Applications may be disregarded, offers revoked or a program terminated if it is believed that false or misleading information has been provided.

### **6.2 Intellectual Property**

Intellectual Property (IP) rights will depend on the policy of the host institution, any IP laws of the home country and any agreement that may have been negotiated between the recipient and the host institution. In addition, wherever any work is reproduced, the creator of the work must be identified. If a recipient has further concerns, they should seek independent legal advice about the ownership and IP rights for any research material.

### 6.3 Privacy

The IEIF – ASEAN Research Collaboration Project is bound by the provisions of the *Privacy Act 1988* (Privacy Act). Schedule 1 of the Privacy Act outlines the Australian Privacy Principles (APPs), which prescribe the rules for handling and storage of personal information, including sensitive information.

Personal information is defined by section 6 of the Privacy Act as: “information or an opinion about an identified individual, or an individual who is reasonably identifiable:

- (a) whether the information or opinion is true or not, and
- (b) whether the information or opinion is recorded in a material form or not.”

Without collecting your personal information, we will not be able to process your application. Information collected in your application will only be used by the ATIH at RMIT University for the following purposes (‘the purposes’):

- Assessing applications, including to determine eligibility;
- Administering the IEIF – ASEAN Research Collaboration Project, including the payment of stipends and allowances, monitoring and evaluation of internships, writing the visa Letter of Support;
- Promoting the IEIF – ASEAN Research Collaboration Project, including in promotional material, information and publications in hardcopy and/or online, undertaking community engagement, and
- Communications, including notifying applicants about whether their applicant has been successful or unsuccessful, congratulating and/or inviting successful recipients to functions and events held in Australia and overseas, any communications with applicants in the course of assessing applications and administering the internships.
- Delivering the post-internship survey for monitoring and evaluation purposes.
- Creation of a final written report with recommendations on conducting similar projects in future, which may be made public on the department’s website.

You are not required to provide sensitive information as part of your application. It is advised that you avoid disclosing sensitive information in your responses. This includes, and is not limited to, the following:

- political opinions and/or membership of a political association;
- philosophical beliefs;
- racial or ethnic origin;
- religious beliefs or affiliations;
- membership of a trade union;
- sexual preferences or practices; and
- health information

Please **do not** provide sensitive information in your responses.
