Reflection on HDR/ECR Research Symposium 2025

In September, Housing@RMIT held its inaugural Higher Degree by Research and Early Career Researchers Symposium 2025. With support from the Enabling Impact Platforms and as part of Social Sciences Week, the event was keynoted by **Wendy Stone of Swinburne University** with a personal reflection on the changing trajectory of housing as a scholarly topic, and academia's shifting approaches and opportunities for praxis.

A total of **16 presenters** shared their research in three sessions, covering themes of politics and policy, economics and finance, design, advanced technologies and administrative governance. A big congratulations to **Madeline Abigail Lukito**, **Moein Behzad**, **Lucia Valentini** and **Shanika Kanchani Manamperi**, who were selected as presenting particularly outstanding work! During the closing activity, participants reflected on the necessity for a more ambitious vision for the future of housing in Australia. They emphasised that housing policy, planning and practice should provide the infrastructure of care required for a resilient, sustainable and equitable future, accommodating the evolving needs and aspirations of Australia's diverse population.
