Invitation to join the Housing@RMIT contribution to audit "Housing Australia Future Fund (HAFF)"

The Australian National Audit Office (ANAO) is currently auditing the Housing Australia Future Fund (HAFF). ANAO is examining two questions related to the HAFF:

- Did Treasury effectively design the Housing Australia Future Fund?
- Has Treasury established effective delivery arrangements?

As part of this audit, ANAO is seeking contributions until 25 January 2026. We are seeking to make a submission organised through the Housing@RMIT network.

Given the timing, we were planning to have a shorter submission which has two sections, one focused on each of the questions. We have tentatively thought of these as policy design and policy implementation. We think that up to five topics for each of these would be reasonable, with each topic having a clear intro/summary and ending with recommendations or policy implications. These would then be brought together in an executive summary (we think this should be less than three pages).

At this stage, we will be holding a meeting on Friday, 5 December at 10 am to discuss the submission and determine some themes. After that we plan on holding two workshops, which can be further planned in the meeting of Friday, 5 December.

Sustainable City Walking Tour

On 18 November, Housing@RMIT members joined the City of Melbourne for Day 2 of AlterCOP 30 Australia on a guided Sustainable City Walking Tour. The tour began at narrm ngarrgu Library, a 5 Star Green Star rated building, and the City's flagship public library and family services hub, co-designed with First Nations artists and community. The group then visited leading sustainable projects across the CBD, including 500 Bourke Street, where a major retrofit retained the existing structure and avoided 57,000 tonnes of embodied carbon emissions, and Council House 2 on Swanston Street, Australia's first 6 Star Green Star building. A stop at the Power Melbourne community battery network showcased neighbourhood-scale energy storage supporting renewable integration.

Throughout the walk, the group explored themes of adaptive reuse, city greening, electrification, and water-sensitive urban design. The tour concluded at 120 Collins Street with reflections on Melbourne's evolving sustainable cityscape.
