The first few months of 2020 started strong for Ngarara Willim on the back of a successful year in 2019. In December we celebrated the achievements of 122 Graduates across both Vocational and Higher education programs at our Deadly Alumni End of Year Celebration.

Ngarara Willim city campus opened its doors to a newly renovated Centre that provides space and allows for a larger computer lab, extra study rooms, a larger social area and a shared kitchen. Early in the year Ngarara Willim celebrated the achievements and success of students engaged in the Career Trackers program. One student was awarded the 'Mark of Excellence - Internof the year'

and several students awarded 'Gold Diaries' for their distinction average or higher results for the year. The Ngarara Willim Centre also won the Career Trackers 2019 'University Partner' award for leading University.



The year had an impactful change in March when COVID-19 spread rapidly, and far and wide, and Ngarara Willim staff commenced working remotely. RMIT programs went online and we quickly moved forward with contacting all students. We checked in with students to support them through recent changes to study and providing support with access to resources to cater for online learning.

Ngarara Willim continue to deliver academic, social and cultural programs to our students and have adapted to remote working delivering initiatives online.

This will enable us to support you throughout the application and enrolment process. The IAP is for people who meet the prerequisites for their chosen program, and consideration is given to life, work and academic experience. There are also scholarships available to students commencing mid year, and there is something for everyone. We encourage all applicants to submit an application to receive a scholarship while they're studying. If you're unsure about where to begin your learning journey, you might want to consider a pathway. Feel free to reach out and discuss your options.

The success of Gama-dji also relied upon the involvement of RMIT staff from across the university, who connected with our new students and shared vital knowledge and information to ensure success at RMIT. We also had several community organisations attend the HE orientation day where students were given the opportunity to make connections, learn about services that are available and chat about ways to get involved in the community.

The orientation culminated in our official Gama-dji dinner, where Ngarara Willim staff joined students and their families at Captain Melvilles in Melbourne city. The dinner was a wonderful way to get to know everyone and make connections that will continue to grow throughout each student's journey at RMIT.



The Ngarara Willim Tutoring Program is a specialised tutorial program funded by the Commonwealth Government to improve the education of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people studying at RMIT.

Distinguished Professor Aileen Moreton-Robinson joins RMIT

Ngarara Willim are very pleased and excited to have Distinguished Professor Aileen Moreton-Robinson join us at RMIT as our first Indigenous Elder Scholar in Residence. Professor Moreton-Robinson is one of Australia's pre-eminent First Nations academics and was the country's first Indigenous Distinguished Professor. Most recently Professor Moreton-Robinson was the first Indigenous scholar elected from outside of the US into the American Academy of the Arts and Sciences which was founded in 1780. Professor Moreton-Robinson joins other international members who include Charles Darwin, Albert Einstein, Martin Luther King Jnr and Nelson Mandela.

Congratulations on confirmation of PhD Candidature

Congratulations to Shannon Kilmartin-Lynch who has recently passed his confirmation of PhD candidature. Shannon is an RMIT Vice Chancellors pre-doctoral research fellow studying a PhD on composite materials in concrete. Shannon's research involves incorporating Indigenous knowledge systems and raw methodologies, introducing them into concrete mix designs to aide with curing and reliability when using recycled materials as a replacement for natural aggregates.





Studying Off Campus

Ngarara Willim have been looking into the Indigenous Programs that are run off campus for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in community and how support can be better accessed by these students.

In 2019/20 RMIT programs included Diploma of Community Services, Diploma of Alcohol and Other Drugs as well as Conservation and Land Management. Students have been studying in the Northern Territory, Regional Victoria and Melbourne (Dandenong and Preston) with more to come later in the year. Indigenous organisations partnering with RMIT in 2019/20 include: VACSAL, Dardi Munwurro and the Dandenong Co-Op.

To date we have been able to provide opportunities for these students to participate in the Gama-dji Orientation Program, Access academic support as well as customising career and employment information that's relevant to these students working in community.

Students, for the first time will benefit from scholarships, tutoring support, study tours as well as access to other services across the University that provide relevant assistance to meet student needs.


Students now have the opportunity to connect in a more meaningful way with RMIT and feel like they belong to the Ngarara Willim Community.

In Conversation: Critical Indigenous Studies



Building on previous public talks hosted by the Office of Indigenous Education and Engagement, Ngarara Willim held an intimate panel conversation with three erudite Professors on the topic of Critical Indigenous Studies.

RMIT's Professor of Indigenous Research, Distinguished Professor Aileen Moreton-Robinson

was joined by Professor Brendan Hokowhitu and Professor Linda Tuhiwai Smith PhD, both from the Faculty of Indigenous Studies at New Zealand's University of Waikato.

The three Professors were in Melbourne editing a book, with Professor Steve Larkin, and Ngarara Willim were lucky enough to host the event in the new refurbished Ngarara Willim premises.

This new handbook changes the certainty of disciplinary knowledges produced in the 20th century when the study of Indigenous peoples, was to a large degree, the knowledge/power domain of non-Indigenous scholars. Scheduled to be released in 2021 from Academic Publisher, *Routledge*, it will also feature RMIT's Dr Crystal McKinnon.

Critical Indigenous Studies is expanding and establishing its' territory from Indigenous Studies through the work of a new generation of Indigenous scholars.

The audience listened to the main issues that Critical Indigenous Studies encompasses, the key challenges that conversationalists encounter, and what the future holds for this emerging discipline.

It was a full house and lots of interest for the conversation with audience members bringing insightful questions and four guests were fortunate to receive a signed book of a previous collaboration by the panellists.

Ngarara Willim looks forward to hosting more discussions like this in the future.

Ngarara Willim were lucky enough to put in a team made up of staff, students and alumni to compete against 5 other teams in our group. The Ngarara Willim team showed great effort and continued to improve throughout the day, despite all these players not playing on the same team before!

Wellness Packs for Community

The Ngarara Willim team, Yappera Children's Service and Djimba Consulting team are pleased to have created a "Wellness Package" for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families isolating at home and keeping their community safe. These packs are intended to provide families with useful information and activities for the kids. These packs include:

- Ngarara Willim Merchandise (pencil case, mini pencils, ruler, sticker, stress ball)
- A "Calm Baby" essential oil roller from Earth Blended
- More stickers and a lucky dip item (either a paint pot and stamp, a frisbee, a skipping rope, or sports cone with a tennis ball).

National Indigenous Business Summer School

In partnership with University of Melbourne and Swinburne University, RMIT University supported the delivery of the National Indigenous Business Summer School (NIBSS), an initiative of the Australian Business Deans Council. The NIBSS is an exciting program developed for Indigenous high school students entering Years 11 and 12 who are thinking about studying in the world of business, becoming an entrepreneur, owning a business or just curious about studying at University.

The purpose of the program was to provide a fully immersive experience for students thinking of entering the world of business or becoming an entrepreneur. Students were given the opportunity to experience what daily life is like as a university student and hear from great speakers in the sector. Students also had the opportunity to see business in action and learn about the available pathways into business studies. During the students week long stay in Melbourne, the NIBSS students participated in:

- Working in groups to develop a marketing strategy for the Aboriginal Carbon Foundation, then judged by a panel of professionals in the sector
- Making Mangrooks at Richmond Football Club
- Hear from tennis legend, Evonne Goolagong Cawley about her story and about the Evonne Goolagong Foundation
- Spent an afternoon at the Australian Open
- Visited RMIT City Campus for a tour of the College of Business, attended a design thinking work shop, heard from Jirra Harvey and Ngarara Willim Students
- Attended a celebration dinner with entertainment from John Wayne Parsons
