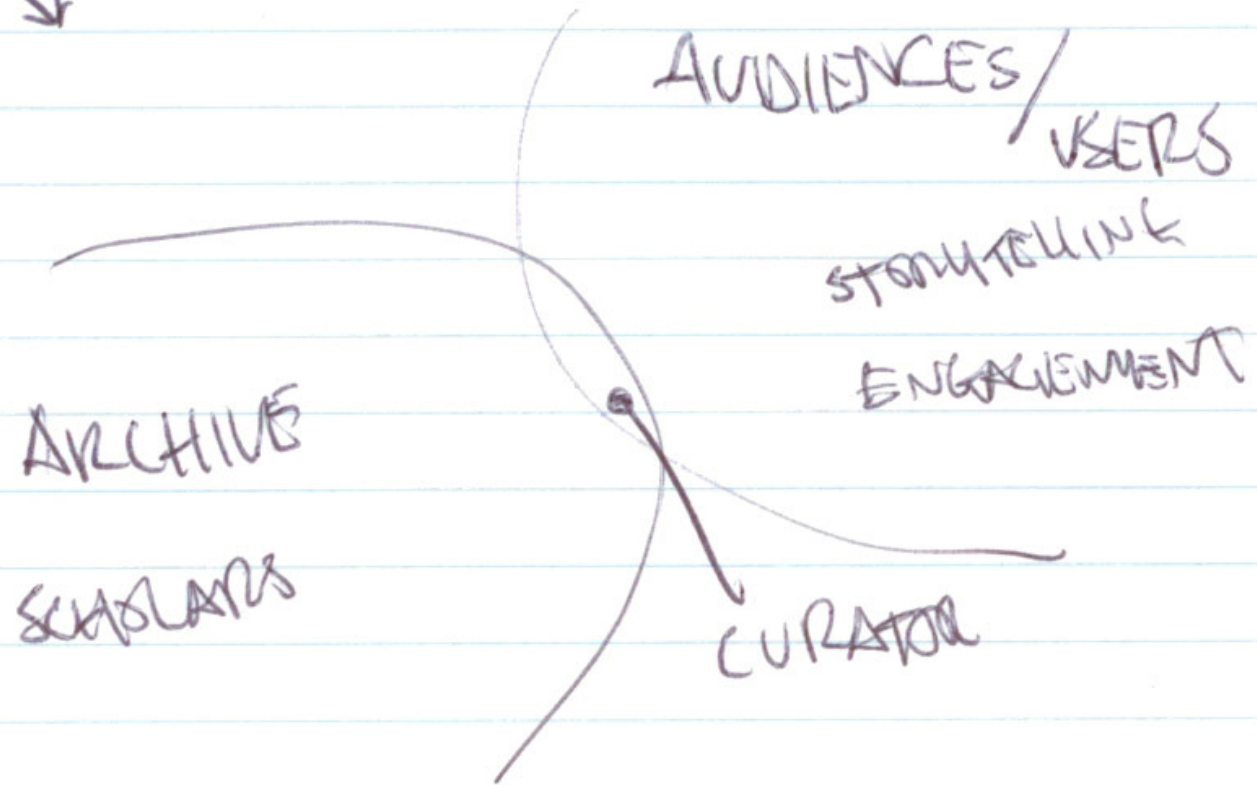
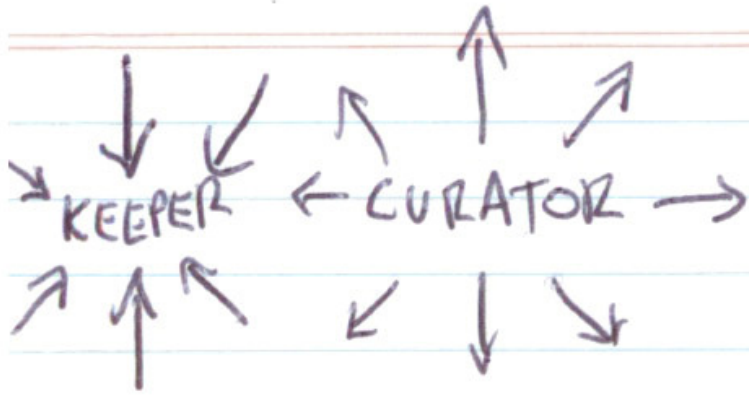

- collections are more than the sum of their parts - don't think of collections as a series of silos - transdisciplinary approach^{critical}
- there's a cost to collecting - think critically about what you collect and what you do with it
- stories behind objects support the collection & its significance
- investigate 'Digitool' + NZ Kōwhiri program - possibilities^{at} access + preservation tools
- copyright - Annie's 3 forms re IP transfer
- 'Digitool' has capacity to convert file to today's 'whatever today means'
- Games fan community is a rich + rigorous research resource - can do/provide the research that museum doesn't

have the resources to do → popular memory archive.

concept transferable to other contexts

use colleagues / students with expertise to assist with projects for which museum doesn't have resources (technical, personnel)

- How can the voices of all makers be 'present' in an archive? And in what form? how 'ideal'?
- For living archives how do you manage ongoing management?
- to remix enable or, not?

- so important to remind that 'curators' have an important cultural role outside the management of organisations
- very useful to get the full 'spectrum' of info. collecting ... libraries, museums, archives ... & to understand our shared concerns.
also of interest that the roles of librarians, archivists etc. are bleeding together.
- DocAM is the name of the Canadian project to develop standards for the preservation of 'media arts' objects.
