Context

Geoplaced Knowledge examines how the intersection of design and networked media, including cartographic systems, with traditional forms of knowledge such as empirical historical research and cultural theory, can create new forms of knowledge, particularly concerning the understanding and construction of place.

Research within the Project is clustered into two groupings:

- Designing Place: Mapping Place
- Service and Social Design

The first of these projects, Designing Place: Mapping Place explores the many different facets that comprise the designing of place. It is firmly grounded in the understanding that place is a cultural phenomenon and that the designing of place, and the mapping of place is enabled through the cultural heritage of a site – past, present and future. Within this grouping Geoplaced Knowledge has provided seeding funding to a number of projects related to the Archive.

The Digital Archives Project

Through a series of investigations the Digital Archives Project explores ways in which information (historic, contemporary, tangible, ephemeral, performative) is collated and communicated through digital technologies. These projects explore issues from technical constraints, legal issues and communication interfaces. The Digital Archives Workshop is an opportunity for associated scholars to share their research and reflections with others who are involved in this sector of cultural heritage.
